


Oct 25th Demo Recap (Kurt Andersen)

Kurt's artistic journey began at age 12 with a painting class at a local recreation center in lowa, where he learned foundational principles he still applies. Over time, his experiences—atelier training, academic studies, and professional practice—have informed a balanced approach that values both structure and spontaneity in painting.

Kurt started the demo by emphasizing the importance of lighting your subject in painting, particularly the role of strong shadows in creating depth and drama. He explained that his approach often involves working with a limited

palette of four colors plus one: Titanium White, Cadmium Lemon, Cadmium Orange, Ivory Black (premixed with Raw Umber), and Ultramarine Blue. He uses *Winsor & Newton* paints and now opts for Permanent Alizarin Crimson instead of traditional Alizarin, which tends to turn brown with age. For his demos, Kurt works on a canvas taped to a board, typically 12x16 inches, and begins with the largest brush he can manage, often a filbert bristle brush from Rosemary &



Kurt stressed the importance of not "starving the palette," encouraging freedom and experimentation with paint. Quoting Sergei Bongart, he highlighted how using inexpensive materials can liberate artists to paint more boldly and broadly, contrasting this with the atelier philosophy of conserving high-quality materials.

Kurt prefers to build his paintings from the outside in, focusing on large shapes and masses before refining details. He avoids committing heavily to the initial drawing, allowing flexibility and adjustments as the work progresses. This approach aligns with his belief in treating nothing as too precious, fostering a mindset where every element

can be reworked. In his process, the first stage involves blocking in dark values and large shapes to establish the painting's structure. As he progresses, he transitions to deeper, richer colors and thicker paint, working toward chromatic unity with his limited palette. He avoids ultramarine in flesh tones early on, keeping the color choices simple. As detail is added, he gradually shifts to smaller brushes, refining the forms and textures.



Kurt talked about his atelier education in Minneapolis, where he spent 4 years mastering drawing and understanding values through prolonged studies of plaster casts and live models. This rigorous training emphasized precision and detail, but Kurt's post-atelier exploration has leaned toward greater freedom and expression. Kurt's three pillars of painting—Conceptual (the big idea and visualization), Visual (seeing shapes and colors), and Technical (tools

and techniques)—guide his practice. He believes technical skills serve both the conceptual and visual aspects, and even just observing technical demonstrations (and that's what you usually get in a demo) can lead to breakthroughs in understanding.



During the demo, Kurt also discussed techniques like using a viewfinder to frame compositions, lightly sketching to start, and employing methods such as unfocusing his eyes or glancing to the side to capture a broad impression of the subject. These tools help him maintain focus on the overall composition rather than getting lost in details too early. He concluded by adding vibrant highlights and richer colors, sculpting the paint on the canvas until it achieved the desired effect.
