Sept 27th Demo by Bryan Jernigan

300g Watercolor paper from Dick Blick, (go on Sunday, no parking restrictions!)



Bryan started by talking about two sides if his art, abstract art and more representational landscapes (even his website reflects offers a separate entry points for each style). Then he showed us various tools including wide brushes, painting knives, a catalyst wedge, silicone blades, a window screen tool, and more unconventional items that can be found in a kitchen, bathroom, or a child's playbox . We learned that with a silicon blade one stroke can put paint on, but another take the paint off, and that we need to stay judicious



with "interesting marks." Bryan noted that critiquing abstract art can be challenging, but the focus should

be on elements like composition, value modulation, and color harmony. Bryan emphasized the benefits of being a part of a critique group, especially for abstract artists, as it provides valuable perspectives.

Bryan divided a 18x24 Cold Press watercolor paper into six sections using tape. Instead of treating



them as individual pieces, he painted over the tape to allow for larger, more expressive strokes across the entire surface. The tape was removed at the end to reveal the underlying composition, creating distinct "cells."



Bryan used a limited palette of three primary colors plus black and white, stressing the importance of mixing colors rather than simply adding more. Bryan also discussed the role of black in abstract art. He explained that paint straight from the tube tends to be a middle value, so additional techniques are needed to push the contrast. Instead of underpainting, Bryan worked starting with color and refining the composition as he progressed, paying attention to the value range.

He demonstrated how a foam roller delivers more paint than a brayer, and used his whole body to create marks, enhancing the physicality of the process. Techniques like subtractive painting, where wet paint is scraped away to reveal underlying layers, and making connections between color areas were also explored. After removing the tape, the sections are cut out individually and evaluated as separate pieces. Bryan suggested viewing them in different orientations and imagining them on a larger scale. He also discussed the mounting process, using acid-free materials for longevity, and shared insights on "float mounting" techniques.





The demo concluded with Bryan's reflections on abstraction as a dialogue between the artist and the painting. He noted two entry points into abstract art: reacting to something tangible or expressing how one feels. Bryan encouraged flexibility, saying, "If it's not coming out as planned, you can wrestle with it or go with the flow." He also advocated for stepping away from a painting after a set time and working on multiple pieces simultaneously to maintain fresh energy. Bryan closed by highlighting the freedom to make changes: "If you don't like it, change it. If you like it, leave it."




